Income Guidelines

Income is just one of the eligibility factors considered in your application. If you meet these income requirements, it does not mean you are definitely eligible for SNAP benefits. (Updated 02/01/23)

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Frequently Asked Questions

What is SNAP? Is this a new program?

The program has been around for many years, but the name is new. SNAP stands for **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program** and was formerly known as the **Food**

Stamp Program. It is a federal nutrition program that helps people purchase more of the nutritious food they need and enjoy.

In Massachusetts, more than just the name has changed. Changes to the way applications are processed and renewed have made more people eligible and increased benefits for many people.

Who is eligible for SNAP?

Single people, families, the elderly, working couples – all types of people receive SNAP benefits. Eligibility is based primarily on household income and certain expenses.

What is the maximum monthly benefit I can receive for my household size?

What can I deduct from my monthly income?

- Earnings from wages (for those who are working)

- Shelter Costs [rent or mortgage (principal and interest), property taxes, and homeowner's insurance]
- Utilities

See below:

- **Medical Expenses** (for age 60+ adults & disabled individuals – you must be spending \$35. or more per month to claim this deduction)

- Dependent Care Costs (for those caring for children or disabled adults)
- Court-ordered Child Support Obligations
- Homeless Deduction (for homeless individuals and families only)
- Standard Deduction (based on household size)
